From the Circuit Office and Beyond

Dear Friends

I am writing this letter in the early days of January 2023. Christmas has come and gone as has the New Year. Epiphany is now but a distant memory and we find ourselves back in what the Church



Calendar calls "Ordinary Time". This will continue for just a few weeks until we arrive in the period of Lent which begins on Wednesday 22nd February 2023.

On top of this part of the Liturgical Calendar the Methodist Church has another cycle which we need to follow. Over the past few weeks Stewards have been working on the preparation of various statistical returns that need to be completed. These cover all sorts of things such as the state of our buildings, our links with the local communities, statistics about attendance at church and information about our finances. All of this information needs to be collated and then submitted to the District in time to report to the Spring Synod where our information joins that from all the other churches so that a picture of the current work of the Methodist Church can be prepared and shared with those who need it in order to plan for the future. I am truly grateful to those who keep an eye on the data within the Circuit so that they can deliver it when it is needed.

Another important document that needs to be prepared at this time of year is the Report of the Circuit Trustees to the Charity Commission. The Circuit Leadership Team and I are currently working on the document for the Church Year 2021 - 2022 which covers 1^{st} September -31^{st} August. This might seem to

be a bit late, but the reason for this is that the Methodist Year runs between these dates which is also our accounting period. The Report presents an outline picture of the work of the Staines and Feltham Circuit and records significant events that have shaped the Circuit over this time. On this basis it covers things that may have slipped out of view for most of us such as the completion of the sale of Wendover Road and the purchase of the part of the Feltham Manse that had been owned by the United Reformed Church. Changes in the details of people who have a role in the Circuit are also recorded. For this reason this report notes that the Rev. Alan Wickens retired in April 2022 and that Rev. Juliet Ushewokunze "sat down" on 31st August 2022. We need to wait until the next Report to inform the Charity Commission that Rev. Dr. Kofi Tekyi-Ansah has joined us!

I noticed as I was compiling the report that our recovery from the effects of Covid-19 is rather slow, but in my conversations around the Circuit I know that it is speeding up a bit now and this will hopefully be reflected in the next report. One other thing that I have noticed is the increasing number of vacancies for the posts that are mentioned within the Report. The effect of this is that some Churches and groups are not as well represented as they might be at the Circuit meeting and elsewhere.

A draft copy of the Report will be sent to members of the Circuit Meeting for their consideration prior to their meeting due to take place in February. Subsequently the Report will be submitted to the Charity Commission and it will be available on their Website in due course.

If you would like to see the Report you could either contact me at the Office or you could visit the Charity Commission website after Easter. In the meantime I hope that you manage to steer clear of the winter bugs and that you will be blessed as we enter the season of Lent.



Many of you here today would have known Ed through his submissions to the Middlesex Chronicle and particularly his weekly column on local history 'Looking Back' - I am told he submitted some 1500 articles over 25 years

There was nothing common or ordinary about Edwin Thomas Menday MBE, although he would say 'when asked' where he was from, he would say "I am citizen of this world" short but salient response but they summed up the man. He was awarded the MBE for his services to education and long service as Governor of Longford School Feltham

As we heard Ed was born in Morden but came to Feltham in 1936 to live at 'and one that became his only home' in Feltham 'Percival Road' – here, I am sure, that Ed would interject and give the reason why the road Is called <u>Percival Road?</u> But that was his enquiring mind

Ed, although he never married, had a very active and busy life from his day's when he ran 2nd Feltham Boy's brigade 'THE BB' – running it for 30 years or so. As these images here attest



In this image he is with 2nd Feltham BB with other young people's groups 'scouts' etc 'forming up' – this was in Letchworth Avenue – Letchworth is at the northern end of Bedfont Lane – not sure of

the occasion but Ed is playing the Bass marching drum – on the right in this image is Stan Gardener of 1st Feltham BB - Stan was also a member of Southville Methodist Church



Here in this image with Alfie Bass' the well known actor - this was on the occasion 'I believe of the opening of Feltham Assembly Rooms 1965. The Mayor of Hounslow is to the right of Alfie Bass, then James Menday, then Peter Watson also, next-but-one, is Jimmy Redhead, a

drummer with the BB, who in 1971, was drummer of local band called Matchbox!.

And here at one of the many 'camps' - - and an induction of new recruits, in Feltham Park








He is in many other images from his participation in the much lamented but wonderful Feltham Carnival to Bedfont Lakes Country Fair, and many other celebrations 'in the high street 1953 at the occasion of our late QUEENS' Coronation/ Feltham Carnival





He, together with his brothers Ernie and Stan, produced many 'children's shows' they would be seen at many venues and provide light entertainment, performing conjuring tricks, 'slap stick' comedy and generally singing and dancing acts. His personnel 'business card' says " a smile and a song" and he calls himself "the modern entertainer"





He had an enthusiasm for cycling! 'indulging his passion' by forming what was called Feltham Road Club in the late 1950's – it could be said that cycling sustained his longevity together with his personal mantra "Menday you should be

<u>somewhere</u>". His cycling took him far and wide 'the length and breadth of this country and a tour of Ireland and the near continent. He would think nothing of cycling off 'over night' to view the sunrise at Stonehenge. Following retirement from his cycling days he became a commentator for the Round Britain Milk Race.



Here he can be seeen interviewing Ron Coe 5 times national professional champion gold meddalist 1959 - and showing Councillor Ted Paulling 'how to do it'- and again himself on a 'high



wheeler' 'penny farthing' in CLOWN' garb and again interviewing at one of the Milk Race stops – I think this is Hampton Court Bridge





He was invited to be at the six-hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Bridgettine Order at Syon House with the Duke of Northumberland and Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Mayor of Hounslow and Councillor Sue Sampson and some other bloke!!




He, with others, was instrumental in organising Feltham Remembrance Day parade and Service, for 30 years or so must here apologies if I do not mention all the many groups associations, societies, clubs etc that Ed was involved



with - as there were so many - but here are a few

He was active with Feltham Rotary, for which, he would, 'at oft times' collect for many worthy causes - and at Christmas time would don the garb of Father Christmas or as one of Santa's little helpers and tour local streets, however health and safety requirements put paid to the street collection but he was still to be seen collecting in the foyer of Feltham Tesco's for many years.

He was a member of the broadcasting staff on West Middlesex Hospital Radio "Radio West Middlesex" this image was part of the celebratory booklet on the 25th anniversary of Radio West Middlesex



He was also President of Feltham Choral Society for many years.

And Of recent times he was one of a number of local history interested Felthamites who joined the call by the history group's founder Peter Watson to join what Peter called Feltham Work



Shop in '1996' – 'Peter is here today' - until recently Ed was Chairman of the History Group, at which he gave many a talk on local history at the history group's meetings, plus displays in Libraries and other venues around the area



Continuing on the history theme he was a member of Hounslow & District History Society - present at many of their meetings and displays and here at the installation of the renovated Gates and Pillars to Isleworth Cemetery – this was in 2019

If nothing else! hopefully I have stirred memories of Ed and your own participation in some of the events that have been mentioned

Eddie joined the select band of centenarians October 2022, an attainment his "dear old Mum" also made - and he will be laid to rest with her in Feltham Cemetery.



My (Rev Julie Underwood) Journey to Ordained Ministry



From time to time I have been asked how did I come to be an ordained minister (usually a friendly if quizzical question!) and I am still being asked, even in retirement. My short answer is that it was God's idea and certainly not mine, though I don't regret it for one moment.

I was confirmed as a Christian 40 years ago in Staines Methodist Church – a mum with a young family who had been re-

introduced to church and found faith through the encouragement of Methodist friends. My faith developed and grew through church activities and helping in Sunday School until people started hinting that I should train as a Local Preacher. I did not think that was a good idea! John 21: 15 – 19 had spoken to me during a church service but I did not know why. There were more nudges over a year or so, until at Easter People (a Christian convention like Spring Harvest) I responded to an altar call and the stranger who prayed with me enquired whether "local preaching" meant anything to me. My minister (Rev Ken Garlick) visited me after that and all he said was that if you say yes to God and a door opens, then it's up to you to do something about it. The penny dropped, I was convinced and offered to train as a local preacher. Needless to say, my reservations were groundless and eventually I was recognised and commissioned as a Local Preacher in 1992.

In my mind I thought I was doing enough for God, but I started to get a niggling feeling that there was something else and it would not go away. My fight with God over local preaching had taught me to respond to such feelings. I desperately sought answers until one day a friend described my feelings not knowing my situation, and then directed me to a vocation exploration day. After that day at Wesley College, Bristol, my husband and I were astonished to agree that the only thing that spoke to us was for me to become a presbyteral minister. I was just as amazed to find that my own church minister agreed and so I found myself offering for the ministry. The church tested my call to the ministry over a year in a wide variety of ways and all the time I was expecting for someone to decide it was a silly idea and I would return to family, work and preaching, but that wasn't to be. I was accepted for training and began a part-time course for 3 years through SEITE based in Southwark. Once a

week I had lectures at Southwark; we had weekends away, a summer school and placements and I trained with Anglicans, Methodists and URC. It was a demanding, stretching, wideranging experience that somehow enabled me to enter full-time, itinerant presbyteral ministry.

Hence in 1997 my family and I moved to Hounslow where I took up my first appointment as a probationer minister. My ordination took place in 1999 and since then I had 2 further appointments in Byfleet and Wallington before retiring and returning to Staines in 2014. So how did I become an ordained minister? By following God's ideas, not mine and discovering to my surprise that God uses even people like me in the most extraordinary Kingdom adventures — and still does. . .

Barbara Olive Meakin

3 December 1929 – 7 December 2022
Barbara was born in Tachbrook Road, Feltham to Alice and Frank Sheppard on the 3rd of December 1929. She was one of five siblings; Peggy who was raised by her aunt and later emigrated to Canada, an older sister, Gene, a

brother, Geoffrey, who emigrated to Australia and a younger sister, Sheila. Barbara survived all her siblings.

Her father, Frank, died a few months before the outbreak of World War II when Barbara was just 9 years old. Her mother, Alice, brought all the children up in the Sheppard family home at 88 Burns Avenue, Feltham. She worked several jobs to support her children and was a very resourceful woman who embodied the "make-do and mend" attitude of the time - characteristics that Barbara inherited.

Barbara had a condition known as hypermobility which meant she had an unusually large range of movement in her joints and was particularly supple and used this to her advantage as a contortionist and dancer.

At the age of I4 Barbara auditioned to become part of a juvenile troupe called The Franceska Hurricanes which was established by a Mrs Elliot and her two daughters Patricia and Franceska. The audition was a success and Barbara was soon performing in pantomimes and variety shows around the country and became part of the Elliot family under the guardianship of Mrs Elliot.

In the darkest days of the war, morale was low and Barbara, performing under the stage name of 'Stephania' along with Pat and Frankie, put their diverse talents to good use by entertaining war-weary audiences at variety theatres across the country and were often booked by the Entertainments National Service Association (ENSA) to entertain Canadian servicemen stationed in the South-East of England. The three women became life-long friends.

Barbara was married to Bill and they had four children Marilyn, Geoffrey, Margaret and Mandie. She had four grandchildren and three great grandchildren and numerous other children who thought of her as a grandparent. After her children were born she retired from showbusiness and worked as a secretary and

clerical officer for various local companies and focussed her attentions on raising her family. She never lost her love of music or her desire to entertain. Barbara and Bill would often have a dance in the kitchen when their favourite songs came on the radio and her jitterbugging at family parties left everyone feeling quite exhausted.

Barbara was a talented dressmaker producing everything from dolls clothes and fancy dress costumes to tailored suits and dresses. All her children were well turned out no matter what the occasion! Her knitting skills were legendary and it was a family joke that she could run upstairs to the knitting machine and finish a whole sleeve during a commercial break in her beloved soaps. Sunday afternoons were given over to baking delicious cakes for tea and the week ahead. There were no ends to her creative talents!

She loved her garden and enjoyed growing different types of fruit and vegetables alongside a variety of flowers and shrubs. She loved the bird life in the garden and was particularly fond of her little pond with its resident frogs, watched over by her collection of gnomes. Barbara was fiercely independent and maintained the garden single-handed well into her 80s and only then accepted help albeit reluctantly.

She had a passion for all types of puzzles. The dining table was often deployed for jigsaw puzzles – the harder the better! She was frequently to be found in the dining room listening to plays, audio books and music whilst grappling with the latest puzzle challenge. She enjoyed crosswords and was very skilled at the cryptic ones but also enjoyed "Pitcherwits" which she delighted in introducing to Marilyn and Maggie during lockdown.

Television quizzes were another source of great pleasure, particularly when she knew the answers or learnt something new which she was always keen to share. The advent of Google was quite a revelation and time and again she would ask

family members to "look that up on the Google Box!" meaning a smart phone. She marvelled at the advances in technology and showed a keen interest in how things worked. She especially liked being able to pause a TV programme so a cup of tea could be made without missing any of the show. Or watching Songs of Praise on Catch-Up and enjoying the hymns twice!

After her beloved husband Bill died in 1999, Barbara started to attend this church regularly. She had been a member of the Sunday School at Southville and a Girl Guide in her youth and had always encouraged her children to attend. Barbara was only too happy to don a fancy dress costume at the themed Christmas Bazaars and Carnivals in support of the church's outreach and fundraising activities. In 2001 Barbara was received into Membership of the Methodist Church. She took a full and active part in the life of the church, read in the services on a Sunday and enjoyed being part of the Tuesday Leisure Club. Barbara's winning smile always drew people to her and she wasn't shy in sharing her faith with those she met - be it at the bus stop, in the supermarket, or at the local Derby and Joan Club where she volunteered into her mid-eighties. It was at this club that Barbara's gift for entertaining resurfaced and on one occasion a visiting band finished their performance with Offenbach's Can Can Polka. Barbara could not resist the urge to lead a chorus line in the famous dance complete with dropping into the splits for the finale. The poor band leader had quite a shock when he turned around and saw this elderly lady on the floor but all was well - up she got and took a bow!

Barbara lived in the family home in Imperial Road, Bedfont for 54 years but following several falls, she finally agreed to move to a ground floor flat with garden access at Bristol Court in August 2020. This was during the first lock-down and Barbara was a regular attendee at the Circuit Zoom services. Sadly, shortly after this she became unwell and following a short spell in West

Middlesex hospital she was discharged to The Cloisters nursing home in Hounslow in September 2020. Despite failing health and being confined to bed, her smile never diminished; it lit up her little room at The Cloisters where she was pleased to count staff and residents alike as friends for whom she often prayed. The family were very grateful to the staff who supported Barbara's faith in ensuring she could watch Songs of Praise and listen to Premier Christian Radio – a source of great comfort to her.

Barbara saw many historical moments in her long life; the start and end of the second World War, the accession of three Monarchs, the Great Smog of 1952, the Big Freeze of '63 and the Moon Landing in '69, recession in the 1970s leading to the Winter of Discontent, numerous Royal Weddings and State Funerals, the advent of television, computers, the internet, mobile communications, advances in medicine and of course, more recently, the Coronavirus Pandemic. Throughout all of this she held firm to her faith, lived with a sure a certain hope and ran the race with perseverance.

We thank God for bringing her smile into our lives.
